## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

It gives us great pleasure to present to you this report of the 3<sup>rd</sup> ILDS World Skin Summit (WSS) which took place in Lima, Peru on 13-15 October, 2022.

ILDS WSS was designed as a venue for leaders of global dermatological societies to discuss common and unique challenges and opportunities that they face in their societies and regions, and working together, to identify possible collaborations and solutions. The first WSS was held in Berlin, Germany in 2012, and the second in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam in 2018.

Peru was selected as the site for the 3<sup>rd</sup> ILDS WSS because there is a robust and active dermatological society with many excellent dermatologists; however, providing proper dermatologic care for the general population in Peru, South and Central America poses unique challenges. For the first two WSS, they were held in the midway timeframe between the two ILDS World Congresses of Dermatology. Due to the pandemic, and recognizing the importance of in-person meeting, the WSS in Peru was held 3 years after the last WCD in Milan in 2019.

As we hope you will appreciate from the following pages, the 3<sup>rd</sup> ILDS WSS was a great success. It was attended by 119 leaders, representing 47 societies

from around the world. Patient representatives, World Health Organization, an important partner of ILDS, as well as partners from industry, were all present and actively participated. Productive discussions and interactions took place at plenary and at breakout sessions, many will inform the ILDS on its strategy planning for the next few years.

The success of WSS was due to the attendance and active participation of the members who were there, and those who provided premeeting input. We would like to thank leaders of El Circulo Dermatológico del Perú (CIDEMR), Colegio Ibero-Latinoamericano de Dermatología (CILAD), and the International Alliance of Dermatology Patient Organizations (GlobalSkin) for their active participation in organizing the conference. Special thanks to our Peruvian colleagues for their hospitality, and for the most memorable cultural show at the closing ceremony. Sincere thanks to ILDS staff for providing excellent support to ensure the success of the meeting.

# **PAST SUMMITS**

#### **BERLIN**

The first ILDS World Skin Summit was held in Berlin, with these aims:

- Strengthen the links between ILDS Member organisations
- Share case studies and best practice
- Develop global collaborations
- · Deliver training around the world

During the Summit, we developed a set of Grand Challenges in Global Health. This led to the Global Psoriasis Atlas, which is mapping the incidence and impact of psoriasis on patients around the world.





#### HO CHI MINH CITY

The 2018 Summit programme was developed in consultation with Members to focus on issues that are relevant in the region, including:

- Issues affecting South-East Asia and other under-served regions
- Current important dermatological conditions
- Evolving role of dermatologists
- Scope of service delivery for skin disorders by other health professionals
- Priority humanitarian issues including rare or neglected diseases and patients in lowresource settings

The call to present a unified front while also working in partnership was strong during this conference. This led to increased partnerships with other organisations, including patient groups, and the launch of the Global Dermatology Coalition and increasing our advocacy and policy efforts to help ensure global change.

# **EXPECTATIONS AND GOALS**

The ILDS World Skin Summit is held in between each World Congress of Dermatology and provides opportunities for ILDS Members to engage with ILDS' projects and activities. Both the goals of the programme and the programme itself are informed through member surveys and discussions by the board. The Summit is not a scientific meeting but rather a 'think-tank' style forum to focus on common actions on relevant policy issues, to participate in capacity building activities and to generate ideas of global projects and programmes to improve skin health globally.



# PROGRAMMME SUMMARY

#### **PLENARY 1**

# ILDS Introduction: Working Together For Global Skin Health

The WSS began with a plenary session that gave an overview of the ILDS's activities, highlighted its three strategic pillars of strategic leadership and policy impact, representation and engagement, and fostering access to dermatological education and care, highlighted its seven projects with the WHO, numerous global health dermatology projects run by the IFD within the ILDS, and updated attendees on the Grand Challenges in Global Health (this included updates on the Global Psoriasis Atlas, the recent launch of the Global Report on Atopic Dermatitis and Atlas, and two new reports that will be launching in 2023), and the planned introduction of the ILDS' Global Partnerships for Education and Care, which will encourage collaborations between dermatology departments in regions of the world with various resources.



#### **PLENARY 2**

# What Has Changed 2018-2022: Upcoming Issues, Local To Global

The creation of the COVID-19 and monkeypox registries was discussed, demonstrating how crucial dermatological data is used to update standards and definitions at the highest levels. Conflicts, extreme economic and political instability, and natural catastrophes have all contributed to a sharp rise in migration and refugee numbers over the past few years. In camps for the displaced, skin diseases are a major problem. However, there is still a problem with a lack of funding, qualified medical personnel, and medicine accessibility. The Global Psoriasis Atlas's (GPA, www. globalpsoriasisatlas.org) ongoing progress and success were discussed. The GPA, which originated from a WHO resolution on psoriasis, has developed into a constantly growing network of partners to enhance the worldwide understanding of psoriasis and open up new possibilities for research and training tools. The Global Atopic Dermatitis Atlas (GADA, www.atopicdermatitisatlas.org) and the Global Report on Atopic Dermatitis, both of which were just released, are now both modelled after the GPA. With numerous areas of cooperation between the ILDS and GlobalSkin, patient involvement has also risen. Collaborations include the Global Research on the Impact of Dermatological Diseases (GRIDD) project, which will result in the new Patient-Reported Impact of Dermatological Diseases (PRIDD) measure and is the first global impact research study in dermatology initiated and led by patients (https://globalskin.org/research/ gridd-about). Data gathered using this new metric will help evidence-based advocacy and include the patient voice in decision-making for all conditions by payers and policymakers.

#### **PLENARY 3**

# Unmet Needs In Dermatology: With A Focus On The Latin America, Asia And Africa Regions

The use of topical corticosteroids, which are frequently available in South Asia, as skin lightening agents was explored, along with the potential negative effects of uncontrolled, prolonged use, including striae, acneiform eruption, and cutaneous atrophy. It was discussed how difficult it is to diagnose and cure leishmaniasis in Latin American nations as well as its neglected presence around the globe and how difficult it was to control the Covid-19 infection in Brazil because of a lack of resources, such as oxygen, and a poor vaccination rate leading to some of the highest number of deaths worldwide. The extremely low number of dermatologists and insufficient resources in Africa make it difficult to provide quality dermatological care, but substantial efforts are being made to undertake relevant medical education in the field with the help of specialists from all over the world.

#### **PLENARY 4**

# Feedback From Workshops And Defining A Forward Programme

The key discussion points and possible next steps that ILDS could take in coordination with member societies and patient organisations were outlined in the last plenary session. This gathered together all conversations and presentations to define the direction the ILDS will take over the next four years. In his closing remarks, Lars French, ILDS President, emphasised the participants' call for the ILDS to work with its member societies, patient organisations, and corporate partners to promote education, access to care, a high-quality image gallery, and international registries with high-quality data pertinent to dermatology on a global scale. It was highlighted that the value of a group like the ILDS is in bringing together various stakeholders for a strategic discussion aimed at bolstering the greater dermatological community and enhancing patient care globally.



## WORKSHOPS

#### **WORKSHOP 1**

### Access To New Drugs And Technology/ Innovation In Delivery Of Dermatologic Care: Challenges And Opportunities

A presentation highlighted the challenges in European dermatology and prompted discussions by participants around current and future needs, the quality of care provided to patients, and what planning needs to happen to be ready for the future. Discussion followed around the primary areas of relative risk, accessibility, and costs.

# WORKSHOP 2 Sharing Data And Information: Needs And Solutions

Participants learned about telemedicine in Dermatology using AI /machine learning on skin of colour and discussed how technology can be used to enhance medical practice and free up capacity in areas where there are limited resources. Participants were also introduced to the ILDS and WHO's new Image Gallery which will allow peer reviewed photos, submitted by dermatologists globally, to be linked to the International Classification of Diseases, 11th edition (ICD-11) and create a unified atlas for use by dermatologists globally with quality representation across skin types.

# WORKSHOP 3 Advocacy For Dermatology And Dermatologists

A review of the processes and successes in psoriasis advocacy in Argentina, given its diverse geography and demographics, highlighted the need for dermatologists to expand techniques and find new ways to reach populations in need and support dermatologists in underserved areas.

#### **WORKSHOP 4**

# International Exchange Of Teachers And Learners/ How To Foster International Collaboration?

A presentation on how technology has allowed more educational opportunities was shared, followed by a discussion of some of the main challenges to educational exchange. These include issues around visas, expenses, legal requirements related to medical practice, lack of opportunities and new issues such as COVID-19.

# WORKSHOP 5 Effective Partnership With Patient Organizations

Several case studies were presented by patients looking at challenges in low resource settings, rare diseases, and in Latin America, highlighting the positive impact that patient involvement can have on care and education of dermatological disease. Research on the benefits of collaboration between patient groups and dermatology shows improvements in education, advocacy and research when patients are involved. Presentations were followed by a "world café" style discussion of three main questions around education, working together and best practices.

# WORKSHOP 6 Human Resources For Health/ Health Workforce/ Education Of Dermatology Care Givers

There are many challenges when it comes to providing training for front line health care workers, however new tools are being developed to improve education, increase coverage and involve more dermatologists globally. The use of AI in resource limited settings was discussed, followed by the presentation of the ILDS image gallery and its aim of a more robust photo atlas of dermatological disease, linked to the ICD-11. The tools being developed by the GPA and the methods used to create them were also discussed by the participants before a general discussion was hosted.

## **BURSARY PROGRAMME**

As part of our commitment to encouraging the participation of Members from all ILDS regions, the ILDS again launched a Summit Bursary Programme, after its success in 2018, to support 4 Member Representatives who would otherwise not have been able to attend.

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Great presentations identifying both challenges and opportunities in dermatology. These presentations really illustrated the unmet needs of patients and the need for further health equity.

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

## **EVALUATION**

The WSS was attended by 119 participants from 39 countries, including representatives of 47 societies. Of these 47 societies present, 43 were ILDS Member Societies and 4 were (non-member) patient organisations.

Members who were not able to attend the in-person meeting were invited to join an abridged online meeting ahead of the summit so that they would have a chance to discuss their thoughts and perspectives on the workshop topics as well as hear some key updates on the ILDS activities. This meeting was attended by 10 member societies. The feedback from this online meeting was then shared at the summit with participants.

An evaluation form was shared with participants after the Summit, which was completed by 51 delegates. The overall delegate experience was very positive with 100% of the delegates rating it 'very good' or 'excellent' and 98% stating the Summit met their expectations.






When asked to rate if the objectives of the summit were met, overall more than 90% delegates rated these were met 4 or 5 out of 5. The quality of the plenary sessions was also rated highly with more than 90% rating each as 'very good' or 'excellent'.



### **DELEGATE RATING OF MEETING SUMMIT OBJECTIVES**




#### Objectives as stated in the graph above.
